# **Open** Hand In by 23<sup>rd</sup> September



Open means that "anything goes" The only restrictions is that all parts of the image are your own work.

## Pictorial Hand In by 21<sup>st</sup> October



Some of our competitions are subject specific. Pictorial is an **open** competition. Pictorial is derived from the word – picture – so all images are potentially pictorial. What makes an image **pictorial**, as opposed to **representational**, is its **aesthetic quality**.

Is it well composed and aesthetically pleasing? This is the only competition which is judged **solely** on the basis of an

image's composition and attractiveness, rather than its subject matter.

**Compositing** is allowed but the image is judged **solely** on its pictorial nature.

#### Patterns Hand In by 18<sup>th</sup> November



Patterns as found naturally in Nature, the built environment etc but **NOT** as **created** in software such as Photoshop or Affinity

#### People Hand in by 6<sup>th</sup> January



Formal or informal, single or group, human portraits or figure studies taken indoors or outdoors. Animal studies are not eligible. This is wider than just studio portraits, and may show people in all walks of life, doing a variety of things

## Three Hand in by 3<sup>rd</sup> February



Go out and hunt for "threes". This was taken in the Falklands -but you don't have to go that far!

## Nature Hand In by 24<sup>th</sup> February



The rules for Nature are quite strict. Essentially the final image should be "as taken"

Editing techniques that are not allowed:

1 Removing, adding to, moving or changing any part of an image, except for cropping and straightening.

2 Adding a vignette during processing.

3 Blurring parts of the image during processing to hide elements in the original scene.

4 Darkening parts of the image during processing to hide elements in the original scene.

5 All conversions other than to complete grayscale monochrome.

6 Conversion of parts of an image to monochrome, or partial toning, desaturation or over-saturation of colour
